Three award-winning rooms that offer easy style for family living.

ast spring, House & Home editor Cobi Ladner and senior design editor Hilary Smyth accepted an invitation to judge a contest held by Decorating Den, a network of franchised decorators across Canada who offer everything from consultation and design to installation of wall and window coverings, lighting, carpeting, furniture and accessories. The decorators submitted their most successful spaces. The three winning rooms, created by four Ontario-based decorators, are all creative, budget-minded and distinctly personal.

"I often work for families with children, who need a safe, comfortable family room," says decorator Marisa Lupo, who redid her own family room with Luisa Maringola. "In my home, I also wanted a room that was elegant and calm. But we now have three children and may eventually move, so we didn't want to invest too much." She painted the walls a camel colour, and added crown mouldings of MDF, a marble fireplace surround and paintedwood mantel. Also new are the muted-green chenille upholstery on the sofa and love seat, tiny footstools for the kids, a spicy red French-country armchair and a handsome but inexpensive armoire for the TV. Most pieces can move along with the family.
